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Dear all

6 weeks into a busy half term and our school continues to be a great place to be. We are enjoying a mostly calm, purposeful and happy term where our children and colleagues are getting on with the business of doing their jobs well, enjoying their day, growing and learning. You will perhaps have heard me say this many times now but I genuinely love our school and the privilege of serving here is something that I never take for granted. This week I have been out in many lessons and also spent time out and about at break and lunch. I have enjoyed some great chats with many of our children and my colleagues. The enthusiasm and generosity, kindness and positivity that many of them show creates an amazing environment for everyone. We have a great number of well mannered, considerate, caring and resilient children here at our school. They reflect the quality of their upbringing, the values and behaviours of their parents and carers and



also of our school. Childhood is a journey, sometimes a tough one and I really appreciate the input from all families in teaching children how to navigate their own path as well as how to be a great person and part of a community.

Establishing boundaries and what is acceptable behaviour and language with children is a challenge and I know we all have our bumps and lumps along the way. In a busy school with over 1300 children and 160 staff there are always going to be issues that need exploring and problems that need a solution. As adults, it's our job to work collaboratively to seek resolution in a calm and thoughtful way so that we can show our children that conflict or even concerns don't have to result in behaviours and language that are offensive or impolite.

Very occasionally this term there has been some highly concerning behaviours from a very small number of children that has resulted in some serious actions and outcomes. Keeping our children safe is a prime responsibility of school leaders and also of parents and carers. Safety can be many things including physical, social and emotional as well as other aspects of safety including consent. Having serious conversations at home and through the personal development curriculum here at school about all kinds of prejudice including homophobia and racism, about sexist and misogynistic behaviour, about consent and respect is very important especially in a world where the influences that our children are affected by are not always in our control. As parents and carers, I urge you to be vigilant regarding these issues, to talk to them and to live monitor the websites, social media and influencers that your children follow on their phones and computers. Whilst it might be an uncomfortable message, I say this from a position of care. It's often valuable to start from the assumption that, especially as our children get just a little older, and certainly by year 8 or 9, they may already be accessing information and influences that might well not be safe or that you consider not appropriate. Let's make sure that we do what we can to navigate this difficult landscape and keep our children safe.

We have had quite a number of prospective children's parents and families visit us for a tour during the school day in the last few weeks. These tours are always led by our incredible sixth form student leadership team. The families they have shown around have fed back to us about the quality of the environment and the sense of family, security, wellbeing and inclusion that we continue to grow and invest in here. This feeling is reflected in some objective data and information that has been recently collected. The number of students being late to lessons in the last month has plummeted and the number of sanctions issued for mobile phone sanctions has also dramatically fallen. We continue to work hard to improve attendance and I am grateful to all families and careers who work with us to promote the very highest standards. These three things alone represent a significant shift in behaviour and attitude. This year we restructured the way our school support and welfare team works and as you know we now have a head of year and full time welfare managers for each year group as well as the tutor team working in collaboration with these colleagues. Their hard work and dedication to your children, with your trust, support and help has made our school a better place to learn, grow and thrive for everyone.

With their commitments to work and life, it's relatively rare for parents and carers to do this but if you would like to have a look around our school during a normal working day so you can see for yourselves what we see here each day, I would love to welcome you.

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Curriculum Matters

Here at Holmes Chapel Comprehensive School we are very proud of our curriculum. Over the last few years, our faculties and the subjects within them have spent time thinking carefully about the 'powerful knowledge' that they need to teach. They have then planned how best to sequence this knowledge and subject specific skills from Year 7 to the end of Years 11 and 13.

Over this academic year, we will be reviewing the content and the sequencing of the curriculum in all of our subjects. At Key Stage 3 we will also be reviewing how we communicate how successfully students have learnt this curriculum to you as parents and carers. We are really looking forward to sharing our plans with you later in the year.

Parents and carers often ask how they can support their children in their learning. One of the best ways you can help is by talking about what they are learning at home. Young people aren't always the best at communicating what's going on in their subjects, so to support you, we have sent you information about learning in your child's year. We will do the same at the start of the Spring and Summer terms.



Over the last few months, we have been working with a charity called Caribbean Elective to submit a bid that provides an amazing opportunity to take 17 students to St Lucia. After a great deal of work our school submitted a bid to the Government led Turing Scheme last term. We are very pleased to announce that our bid was successful and we have received a grant from the Turing Scheme to help support this culturally enriching experience to St Lucia.

In line with the conditions specified by the Turing Scheme, this experience is focused on enabling children who, for various reasons, may not normally have the opportunity to take part in what will be a once in a lifetime experience.

Caribbean Elective believes that education should be connected to the real world and not just inspired by it and here at Holmes Chapel Comprehensive School we feel the same. We are excited that a number of our students will soon have the opportunity to embrace not only the cultural learning that such an experience will bring by allowing them to take part in a range of activities including learning the Kwéyòl (Creole) language, arts, crafts, participating in workshops as well as living and learning in a local community in a very different part of the world.

In the coming weeks and months, we will be working closely with Caribbean Elective as well as their team in St Lucia (Kimhia and Indira Toussaint), who will be helping us explore St Lucia everyday we are there.

New Intensive Training and Practice for SCITT Trainees

One of the new quality requirements for Initial Teacher Training is that trainees do four week-long periods of intensive training and practice, each focusing on a key aspect of teaching. These are called ITAPs and are being driven by our new Lead Mentor, Mr Barrett. Our first ITAP focused on routines and transitions and it has really helped our trainees to get those lesson starts and ends and other routines in the classroom absolutely spot on. Our trainees thought it was brilliant; as one trainee commented "The vast amount of learning happening in a few days is phenomenal." We have already seen the impact of this in their practice.

On Friday we launched our second ITAP, which is all about questioning. Asking the right questions in the right way is pivotal to our children's learning. Mr Fu from HCCS and Ms Pridding (from All Hallows in Macclesfield) set the ball rolling with a brilliant session on Friday morning. It is great that our trainees have the opportunity to learn from excellent practising teachers from a range of schools.

We have 32 trainees this year in a range of subject areas. Applications for our 2025-26 course opened on Tuesday 8th October. 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

Recommended Reads for Black History Month


October is Black History Month, the perfect time for readers to delve into books about Black History. Below are a selection of engaging and informative reads.
