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### Dear all

Remembrance day in our village, and as I imagine across the whole country, was a moving, poignant, thought provoking occasion when we all had the opportunity to think of those who gave their lives in the service of their country, or whose lives were and are still impacted on by the horrors of war. It made us think of service, duty, honour, responsibility, selflessness, sacrifice and placing the needs of others above our own. These are so important underpinning features of our society and are very much the antithesis to a culture of self and self interest which we sometimes hear about. Remembrance always makes me pause and think about how I can be more giving, more caring and how, as your Headteacher, I can better serve our community.

As always, the turnout from our village on a chilly but dry and sunny remembrance morning was incredible. There were many familiar faces and families, neighbours and community members there to pay their respects and take part. Turn out from the local groups including, amongst many others, the scouts, guides, brownies, cadets was amazing. In previous years, Eddie Fu, Head of Humanities and Personal Development, has represented our school at the remembrance parade. It was a privilege for me to be part of the occasion this year and to accompany children from our school, Brianna Hamilton, Jessie Chan and Sam Finnie in the parade. After the service and parade, we joined with the other groups in the churchyard and laid reefs on behalf of our school. The sense of belonging and pride across our community was incredible.

"They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning, We will remember them."







Continuing the theme of community and shared responsibilities, as the nights are now dark and the weather turns wintery, talking to our children about being safe on the roads is something that is hugely important. There are literally thousands of children in our community and as they grow into young adults, one of our roles is to model safe and responsible behaviours. A number of concerned parents, carers and residents have been in touch to comment on road safety. Mostly, their comments relate to children riding their bikes around our village when it is dark and the lack of lights and helmets. Being safe online, being physically safe and being safe in our relationships is something that we cover here in school via our personal development programme which is delivered to all children once a week and also in tutor sessions and in assemblies. However, it's fair to say however that these messages need to be acted on independently by our children during as well as outside of the school day. I'd very much like it if you could talk to your children about being safe on their bikes, wearing a helmet and being visible - Individual conversations and a shared, community wide desire to keep our children safe.

I was very grateful to Tina Cartlidge (Clerk) Chris Jackson (Chair) and Diane Tams (Vice Chair) from Holmes Chapel Parish Council for visiting our school on Wednesday and enjoying seeing a busy school in full swing. We had a chance to see the many site developments that we have invested in over the last three years so that our children have a high quality environment to learn, grow and thrive. We also had some time to visit some lessons and see what it's like when 1308 children are all enjoying morning break as well as how colleagues at our school spend their own time in between lessons, taking care of and interacting with children in order to maintain a calm, safe and secure ethos. ### **Curriculum Matters**



#### Study Skills

It's never too early to start understanding how we learn and revise most effectively. As you will see below, this week we launch our Year 11 support programme. But all parents and carers will be interested to look at our **study skills course** - which we will be developing further over the year. Please take the time to look into this with your child.

#### Sixth Form

Our Year 13s have just finished their first round of mock examinations for year 13 and results are being shared already. Interim reports will be released on 27th November, quickly followed by Parents Evening on 28th November! This is an important time for students to celebrate their successes, reflect on their feedback and start making any necessary changes to keep the progress going.

Our year 12s have made a strong start to their courses this year and are starting to manage their time in study periods to ensure they stay on track and work to exceed expectations. Their first Interim report will be released on Friday 29th November, allowing them to celebrate their successes, reflect and continue to improve.

#### Year 11

Today is the day that our first interim reports are sent home to Year 11 parents. Along with the report, Mr Gallagher has also sent home information about how we will be supporting our students in preparing for their trial exams, which take place after Christmas. #### Year 10

Teachers are just completing the first assessment of students in Year 10 as part of their GCSE and BTEC courses. This means that this is also the time that we will share information about students' targets in these qualifications. This year we have needed to take a new approach to this. In the coming two weeks, Mr Jones and Mr Sneddon will talk to Year 10 students about how we've set these targets and the ambition we have for all of them to achieve their very best. We will also prepare a video explanation for you, as parents and carers, so that you can support this in your conversations at home. It's never too soon for our KS4 students to develop their independent study skills, so you might also want to spend some time watching the videos here, which are part of our Year 11 study programme.

#### **Year 9 Options Evening**

#### Key Stage 3

We are very excited that next week we will be hosting our first webinar session for parents to talk about our new assessment system for students in Years 7-9. This week you will have received an invitation from Mr Jones with details about this session on Wednesday 20th November, which will be the first in a series of opportunities for us to share developments in our curriculum and assessment directly with you. Mr Jones will also be sharing information about this with the students in the coming weeks

#### Lunchcards

Here at our school, we make every effort to ensure that the children can access our lunch and break offerings quickly and safely. As you know, operate a lunch card system which can be charged with money so that the children are not having to carry cash. The card system also speeds up service and ensures that the children can be served and eat as soon as is practical. With over 1000 mouths to feed, lunch is always busy.



There is an increasing number of children who forget, lose or break their lunch card. When this happens our colleagues at the till have to painstakingly write down who the child is, what they have chosen and then manually enter this into the till. It slows down service, creates frustration in the children and leads to delays in them being fed. A rough estimate appears to indicate that a guarter of children are not using their lunch cards.

Can you please ensure that you talk to your child about this and that you make a commitment to making sure that they have their lunch card and it has enough money on it to buy food. As we have done previously, we may have to operate a system where pupils who persistently forget their cards are served after those who are consistently following the correct protocol. This will help massively in your child being able to access food as quickly as possible and enjoy their lunch break.



Here are our recommended reads for this year's Non-Fiction November.







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

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



